

There Is No Place Like Home: Housing Insecurity at UCSD



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Background

- Housing insecurity among college students is associated with poorer academic and health outcomes
- UCSD students face particular difficulties because of high housing costs in San Diego
- Survey of public health students conducted to examine:
 - Current housing situation and costs for UCSD
 - Prevalence, risk factors, and impact of housing insecurity
 - Experience with on-campus housing resources
 - How resources can be improved

Methods

- Qualtrics survey emailed to all BSPH capstone students
- Housing insecurity definition:
- Ever at risk of not having a safe, regular, and adequate
 nighttime place to stay and sleep during current school year
- Epi Info 7.1 used for data analysis and calculation of prevalence rate ratios (PRR), 95% confidence intervals (CI), and p-values
- Response rate: 82% (178/217)

Results

- 17% of students met definition of housing insecure
- 73% lived off-campus and 63% shared a bedroom
- 47% lived ≥ 3 miles from campus
- Reported mean rent \$1050 (range: \$100-\$3075)
- Risk factors associated with housing insecurity:
- Receiving financial aid (PRR=3.3, 95%CI=0.8-13.2, p=0.07)
- Identifying as LGBTQIA+ (PRR=2.2, 95%CI=1.2-4.2, p=0.02)
- Housing insecurity associated with:
- Food insecurity (PRR=1.9, 95%Cl=1.0-3.6, p=0.05)
- Poor mental health (PRR=1.2, 95%Cl=1.1-1.4, p=0.05)
- GPA < 3.0 (PRR=2.6, 95%Cl=1.0-6.8, p=0.07)
- Of the 83% of students who knew about off-campus housing resources, only 18% used them

Conclusion

- Although many students try to save money by sharing bedrooms, average rents exceeded \$1000/month
- Housing insecurity affected nearly one in five, and students who were housing-insecure had higher rates of other adverse outcomes
- UCSD needs to provide additional financial aid and better assist students in locating affordable housing
