Background

- UC San Diego's Bachelor of Science in Public Health (BSPH) program aims to recruit students interested in public health & healthcare careers
- Evaluation requested by BSPH Leadership and Education Committee to assist in future recruitment
- 2022-23 BSPH Honors Practicum cohort conducted a survey of current BSPH majors

Study Objectives:

- Identify pathways and reasons for enrolling in the BSPH program
- Understand the career goals of current BSPH students
- Assess BSPH student retention

Methods

- Anonymous mixed-methods Qualtrics questionnaire sent to all BSPH majors and promoted by faculty members and classroom visits by practicum students in Fall 2022
- Quantitative analysis performed using EpiInfo7.1
- Qualitative data coded thematically using Word and Excel

Results

Quantitative results:

- 37% response rate
- 1/3 admitted directly, 1/3 transfer students, 1/3 changed from other majors (primarily biology at 60%)
- 95% plan to remain in the major
- 60% hope to become health professionals, 24% want public health careers, remainder undecided
- 82% are considering an advanced degree, with 34% aiming for MPH, 6% for Ph.D., 20% for MD or DDS degree, and 32% for other health professional degrees

Qualitative themes:

- More internship/employment opportunities needed
- Lack of diversity through faculty
- Students appreciate being able to choose a concentration & flexible major requirements, dislike working in teams

Conclusions

- BSPH program has high retention
- Most BSPH majors hope to become health practitioners rather than pursuing public health careers.
- Concentration specificity and requirements draw students to the BSPH
- Efforts are needed to improve scheduling of classes and provide positive teamwork experiences.
